Don't "Fall" Into A Trap - Autumn Lawn Upkeep Is Important

A bit of rain and more comfortable weather feels great - especially after the blazing Summer we've had. But, don't relax too much. Proper lawn maintenance continues and is essential at this time of year. Among other things, this means:

>Keep mowing that yard! Each lawn should be evenly cut on a regular basis - most about every 10 days (and rarely more than 2 weeks), depending on the type of grass and growth patterns. All lawns in OHDV need mowing into late October and most into November. This includes trimming and/or edging. If you are unable to cut your grass appropriately or frequently enough, ask your neighbors to recommend some local lawn services. There are many good ones that visit our community regularly.

>Many a leaf has to fall, but it's "fall" in the game. As trees blanket our yards with leaves, we must do something with them. Some neighbors will shred them in smaller amounts as they mow the grass; others will rake them after more have fallen. Remember that bagged leaves (in the proper mulching bags) can be left at the street for Metro brush pickup. Our next scheduled pickup date is on or after September 20. Whatever you do, DO NOT rake or blow leaves into storm drainage areas like street drains, natural detention/retention areas, or the creek areas running beside or behind many homes. This has a very negative effect on rain flow through our neighborhood, can leave a mess in a neighbor's yard, and you could be penalized for doing so.

>Let's stay trim! Flowerbeds, walkways, and driveways should be free of weeds and undesired wild plant life. Bushes and trees should be trimmed regularly. If you time that last trimming of the bushes well, you won't see much growth until next Spring.

>So, you want to decorate? Multiple decoration-worthy holidays coming up! You may want to give your home's exterior a little tender loving care before pulling out the exterior fixins'. DIY

house-cleaning products are always available. And, some of the professional house-cleaning services run specials as their busier season winds down. It is wise to pay attention to gutters that get clogged by leaves from above.



Drive Smart! People walking for exercise, kids playing or waiting for buses, lawnmowers or trimmers flinging debri - these are just a few of the reasons why we must always exercise caution and lower our speed when driving into, out of, and near the subdivision. Per Metro ordinance, never park in a way that obstructs a sidewalk or wheelchair/stroller access to it or in a way that blocks fire hydrants, mailboxes, or intersection visibility. Metro Police can ticket vehicles for these offenses.
